
TRIPP GORMAN, Secretary

Shortly thereafter, Cecil was appointed to Elephant Manager, which earned him the responsibility of overseeing the daily husbandry, enrichment, training, and other aspects of elephant care. Cecil is proud to follow in the footsteps of many dedicated CZBG professionals, including his father, an animal trainer at the Cincinnati Zoo for 50 years.

To further his knowledge of caring for elephants, Cecil became a member of the EMA in 1988 and he is currently a member of the Ethics Committee. Cecil has attended number-

ous EMA conferences since 1988, participated in the Principles of Elephant Management I & II courses, participated in the EMA Training Workshop, and presented papers at EMA.

The last few years have seen a lot of chance in elephant care and management, and Cecil as Elephant Manager has led his team and elephants through this change with great success. Significant achievements include: successful transition from free contact to protected contact, implementation of a formal operant conditioning program with three cows and one bull elephant, expansion of the elephants' enrichment program, development of formal exercise programs for all elephants, and the initiation of the Elephant Welfare Initiative to track and monitor changes in elephant well-being. Overall, Cecil has successfully led CZBG's elephant program to meet and surpass evolving elephant management standards; his practical experience and historical perspective are highly valuable to the future of elephant management in zoos.

Cecil is proud of the program his team and the elephant care community have made in recent years and looks forward to continuing to guide the field forward as part of EMA's Board of Directors. Aside from his professional passions, Cecil is an avid bluegrass performer and enjoys spending time with his family on their 100 acres of land.

# 2022 Scholarship Announcement

This year, the EMA Scholarship Committee is offering three separate opportunities for scholarships:

- 1. EMA Conference Scholarship: \$1,000. This scholarship is open to all EMA members wanting financial assistance to attend the 2022 EMA Annual Conference in Milwaukee.
- 2. AMZAP-EMA Conference Scholarship: \$1,000. This scholarship is open to any EMA member who is also an <u>AMZAP</u> member wanting financial assistance to attend the 2022 EMA Annual Conference in Milwaukee.
- 3. EMA Professional Development Scholarship: \$500. All professional EMA members are eligible to apply for financial assistance through this scholarship to support their trip to another zoo through the EMA Professional Development Committee. More details on this opportunity coming soon!

Applicant criteria for these scholarships include: (1) scholarship winners must be EMA members in good standing for at least six months, (2) scholarship winners must present a paper at the annual EMA conference on a topic that is related to elephants, and (3) scholarship winners must write a paper for the Journal of the Elephant Managers Association (JEMA) on the same topic that was presented at the conference. ## FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Despite challenges imposed by the pandemic, EMA had another good year financially. We made the commitment a few years ago to go paperless with our publications, which was the bulk of our expenses, thus freeing up money for conservation and research support. We have continued to keep membership dues the same price they have been since EMA's inception.

EMA membership dues are our main source of income, which allows us to spend more funds on conservation initiatives. We continue our commitment to research and conservation by supporting projects in range countries and continuing our support for EEHV research. We have increased our awards budget in recent years to recognize long-term members.

## CONSERVATION UPDATE

In 2018, the Research, Education, & Conservation Committee (RECC) was formed, comprised of the chairs and members of each of the respective sub-committees. One of the biggest goals for the RECC was to create overlapping projects, including establishing a Small Grant Program.

After the success of the Small Grant Program over the past several years, we were excited that the Board of Directors decided to continue the program in 2021. The program was announced in *Gray Matters* and on the EMA social media platforms, and shared with organizations such as the International Elephant Foundation, Asian Elephant Support, as well as with long-time supporting organizations of EMA. We received 17 proposals from 12 different countries. During the July 2021 board meeting, the board members decided to award funding to each of the following projects:

### Exploring Socioeconomic Drivers of HEC through Community Workshops

Principal Investigators: Lynn Von Hagen, Christopher Lepczyk, and Bruce Schulte Auburn University and Western Kentucky University

The funds will help support workshops in six villages in the Kasigau Wildlife Corridor in Southeastern Kenya. Working in conjunction with other conservation organizations, these workshops teach the villagers construction methods for various deterrents, climate-smart agricultural techniques, alternative livelihoods, the importance of protecting the environment for future generations, and best practices for living with elephants. Funding amount: \$1,640.

### Community Capacity Building for the Conservation of Elephants

Principal Investigator: Estella Snowden Conservation Lower Zambezi (CLZ)

Established in 1994, CLZ focuses on three main areas: Wildlife Protection, Environmental Education, and Community Empowerment. CLZ's annual three-day "Living with Elephants Workshop" is conducted with 30 to 50 men and women from the local community and encourages coexistence between animals and people and the prevention of injury and loss of life for both elephants and humans. Funding amount: \$1,360.

The principal investigator for each proposal has been notified and we look forward to working with our conservation partners in the coming year. RECC offers a special "thank you" to the Board of Directors for your support of this program again this year.



## BEHAVIORAL ENRICHMENT COMMITTEE

The mission of EMA is carried out by a series of committees dedicated to topics directly and indirectly related to the management of elephants. The Behavioral Enrichment Committee (BEC) is currently comprised of seven active EMA members. From pool buoys to boomer balls to browse, elephant enrichment comes in many forms. However, even with an assortment of enrichment items and experiences to choose from, it is a perpetual challenge for elephant programs to master "the art of enrichment." The BEC is determined to find a solution. At the beginning of 2022, the BEC revitalized the enrichment portion of the EMA website to provide members with a one-stop-shop for their enrichment needs.

Once logged into the <u>Members Only portal</u> on EMA's website, members can access the Resource Database, which includes foundational information for enrichment program development, documentation templates, a picture-based idea book for special occasions, a regional browse and silage list, vendor links, research publications, and news articles. Additionally, the former item-based database is now a searchable picture catalog for users who know exactly what they're looking for and for those who need some inspiration.

The BEC would love to hear from EMA members about resources they would like to see to help with all their enrichment needs. Our motivated committee members are eager to create useful content for the community, and we are currently developing enrichment document templates for structuring, implementing, and assessing enrichment. We would like to place a heavy focus on measuring enrichment in terms of social interactions and environmental happenings, thus reframing enrichment.


